Question Number 1 is compulsory, and will comprise ten short answer questions on passages taken from the six texts, and the students will be required to attempt any five questions. The students will be required to explain given passages in terms of style, technique, allusions, etc. wherever applicable in not more than fifty words. Total number of marks allotted to Question Number 1 will be 20. (Four marks per passage) (4x5 = 20).

Question Numbers 2 to 6 will be long answer questions with internal choice carrying 15 Marks each, and the students will attempt any four : (15x4=60).

The short answer questions will relate to the narrative technique, form, style, allusions, characterization, tone, plot, etc. of the prescribed texts. Total Number of marks alloted to this question will be 20. (4x5 = 20) and each short answer shall not exceed 50 words. Question Numbers 2 to 6 will be long answer questions of 15 marks each with internal choice on the five prescribed texts and the students shall be required to attempt any four (15x4 = 60).

Question Number 1 will be compulsory and will comprise ten short answer questions on 10 passages from the prescribed poets and the students will be required to attempt any five in not more than 50 words. The students will be required to explain given passages in terms of diction, syntax, Stanza-form,

allusions, imagery, symbols and metre wherever applicable. Total Number of marks allotted to Question Number 1 will be 20. (Four marks per passage) (4x5=20). Question Numbers 2 to 6 will be long answer questions of 15 Marks each, with internal choice from within the unit. The student will attempt any four. (15x4=60)
